Nelson Dong, member of Committee of 100, along with Chinese American

scientists Sherry Chen and Dr. Xiaoxing Xi, will present at a seminar at Rice University on Trade Secrets and Economic Espionage - Legal Risks in Advancing Technology between the U.S. and China. They will also explore some of the more notable cases that have been brought by the government against Chinese American scientists and government employees.

Special guests **Sherry Chen** and Dr. **Xiaoxing Xi** will share their experiences as Chinese American scientists who suffered professional, emotional and financial harm when they were accused of and arrested for espionage, only to have all charges subsequently dropped without explanation or apology.
